As the COVID-19 restrictions ended, TWC staff and volunteers got back into the community with more enthusiasm than ever before. We saw the inception of new community events, like the First Annual Women's Wellness Retreat in partnership with The Owen Sound & District Chamber of Commerce, sponsored by TD, the International Women's Day concert at Heartwood Hall, and made appearances at community staples, like the Durham Agricultural Fair. OUR SERVICES

The Shelter is a twenty-bed facility with security and main floor accessibility offering twenty-four-hour crisis intervention and supportive counselling.

PUBLIC EDUCATION

about abuse and women's issues is shared with community partners including schools, community groups, and service clubs.

THE ANTI-HUMAN TRAFFICKING PROGRAM FOR YOUTH

includes counselling, outreach, and housing for at-risk youth between 15 and 18 years of age.

SECOND STAGE RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM

is a safe twelve-unit townhouse complex that provides transitional and supportive counselling within a geared-to-income rent program.

INDIVIDUAL AND GROUP COUNSELLING

is available at the Shelter and Second Stage, for all women regardless of their situation. The outreach program assists women in the community and clients staying at Second Stage connect with local support and services.



WALK-IN CRISIS SUPPORT

is available twenty-four hours per day at the Shelter and during business hours at Second Stage. Trained staff provide phone and text crisis support, information and referrals for women, children, and youth in crisis, twenty-four hours per day.

FAMILY COURT SUPPORT

is provided in partnership with other community agencies to support abused women while they navigate through the Family Court system.

YEAR IN REVIEW

With help from our incredible funders TWC was able to do some renovations, enhance community areas, and provide integral counselling to women, children, and youth who have experienced violence and abuse in the home.

SHELTER KITCHEN

Thanks to the generous funding from Women Shelters Canada, TWC was able to completely renovate the Shelter Kitchen to create a space that will adapt to future pandemic protocols, function better for our Shelter Cook and residents, and put health and safety at the top of the Shelter's priorities.

BASKETBALL COURT

The Youth Hub's Basketball Court received a much-needed Revival thanks to funding from the Community Foundation Grey Bruce. Now, kids at our facilities can build friendships and play safely.



COUNSELLING

The Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF) was an integral funder of the continuation of Clinical Counselling and Child & Youth Counselling programs. With the support of OTF TWC was able to provide free counselling to over 200 women and children who have witnessed and experienced violence and abuse in the home.

During the 2022/2023 fiscal year, we made significant headway in many of our goals.

Lastly, we remained consistent in our agency brand and created open communication streams with donors, community members, and the community at-large, instilling TWC as the go-to agency for helping women, children, and youth impacted by violence and abuse in Grey Bruce.



From our efforts this year, we can confidently say that TWC has made an impact in Grey Bruce.
